The whole of the day was occupied in the trial of Isaac Wood, for robbing the Bank of John Redmond, Esq. in May 1810. The facts of the prisoner contriving to enter the Bank when the doors were shutting in the evening were satisfactorily proved by several witnesses. He was intimate with all the persons concerned in the Bank, and had of course been several times in it. He was represented to be a man who carried on business for several years in a respectable way. The robbery did not exceed a few pound notes and some silver, owing to interruption.

At seven o'clock the Judge charged the Jury—in which he highly complimented Mr. Redmond for his indefatigable perseverance in bringing this offender to justice; and his humanity in not having indicted the prisoner capitally.

The Jury having retired for a few minutes returned a verdict—Guilty. He then received sentence of transportation for seven years.
